Helping our Hedgehogs

Did you know that hedgehogs have been in serious decline – there are now less than one million, compared to estimates in the 1950s of in excess of 30 million in the 1950s? Lea Park has the potential to be an oasis of safety for our prickly friends, but we need to know how to help:

- Linking gardens. Hedgehogs roam up to 2 miles each night so making a 13 x 13 cm gap in the fence or wall between gardens allows them to travel and forage for food and meet mates. If you need help to make a gap in your garden wall or fence, get in touch with Thame Hedgehog Champions via trees@21stcenturythame.co.uk
- *Make ponds and drains safe.* Hedgehogs are great swimmers and climbers but they can't climb out of steep-sided ponds or deep holes. Make piles of stones or a piece of wood wrapped in chicken wire to make ramps, and cover drains and holes to stop hedgehogs getting trapped.



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- Create a wild corner of your garden, letting wild flowers grow to encourage bugs and insects. Log piles, a bug hotel and a compost heap will all provide sources of food and places to hide for hedgehogs.
- A source of water in dry weather is really helpful. There's no need to feed hedgehogs in ordinary conditions since they prefer insects and bugs, but some wet or dry pet food can be a boost if you think they are struggling to find food especially as autumn draws in.
- A hedgehog house in a secluded part of the garden can be a great way to provide a safe place for hedgehogs to sleep, care for their young or hibernate through the winter.
- Feed only if needed. At this time of year, hedgehogs should be hibernating so if you see one out and about it's probably in trouble. Give it some cat or dog food and some water and gently pick them up with a towel and take it to Tiggywinkles Wildlife Hospital in Haddenham. They will look after the hedgehog until it's strong enough to be released back into the wild.

Public Art Trails - an update

Thame Town Council has now finished the installation of the Public Art Walking trail from Thame Meadows (opposite Lord Williams's Upper School to the town centre). Installation of the second trail has also begun - 'The Cavalier and Roundhead Route'. This trail will span Lea Park, and will bring to life details about both the significance of The Moat as well as details about the estate's road names.

Lea Park Road names are all connected to the Civil War. If you haven't already, we would really encourage you to walk into the town centre, via the pathway that runs alongside Barley Hill School into the Cattle Market Car Park. Along the railings you will see some fun artwork, created by students attending Barley Hill School, that bring your street name to life - find out about the Roundhead, Cavalier or Battle that your road is named after. There is one panel (significant to Thame) that is not a street name in Lea Park though - can you find it?

On North Street you will also be able to find a new bench that has fish designs on it. This



bench is connected to the way marker art that will eventually be placed on The Moat.

Lea Park's oldest resident dies at 101

Sqn Ldr Garry Garretts M.B.E. passed away peacefully on 30th December 2023 after a short illness.

He was a founder member of the Lea Park Resident's Association and kindly loaned £500. pending the promised grant of a similar amount from the Town Council. He continued to support the Association attending all the AGMs until last year.

He had a remarkable life including a distinguished service in the RAF. Garry got his wings in Canada, rising to the rank of Squadron Leader with around the world. He flew in the Berlin Airlift, which was one of the highlights of his RAF career and has been interviewed by the BBC, the Imperial War Museum and various newspapers, about the Berlin Airlift and if you Google him, you will find out more about Garry and the Berlin Airlift.

Garry gave talks about the operation to many organisations and raised over £7,000 for the Royal Air Force Association. (RAFA)

> He participated in numerous Remembrance Sunday services laying wreaths for RAFA.

He was a member of Full Circle. a group of older people who had lunch and spent time chatting with groups of children at Barley Hill School. He supported the fete at the school.

He had 23 happy years living on Lea Park in Thame. Sadly, his

wife. Brenda known as Johnnie, passed away in 2018.

Latterly, he was often seen in Thame on his mobility scooter called 'Speedy'.

He leaves a daughter and son-in-law, Diana and Andy Hunt; a son and daughter -in-law, Chris and Jayne Garretts, two grandsons and three great grandchildren.

He will be greatly missed as one of the legendary figures of Thame.

Alan Kidd, NDD

Alan studied Art at Walthamstow College of Art, in Essex from 1961-65, where he was fortunate to benefit from tutors like Peter Blake, Fred Cuming and Ken Howard, Anne House and Cedric Horner. His career was in illustration, advertising, and graphic design. Alan and his family have lived on Lea Park, Thame for the last 39 years. Since retiring as a freelance graphic designer, he is now active in the field of fine art.



Alan is best known for his landscape paintings inspired by the beautiful landscape around Thame. His work has been shown at various local exhibitions throughout Oxon and Bucks including exhibitions at The Obsidian Art Gallery near Stoke Mandeville and Fitch & Fellows in Thame. He has been experimenting creating mono woodblock prints using acrylic paint on various surfaces.

Alan has twice had self-portraits selected for the prestigious international Ruth Borchard Self Portrait Competition. As well as many private collections, his work also hangs in public collections at Aylesbury Vale District Council Offices, Stoke Mandeville Hospital, and The House of Lords Art Collection. 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Update on Lea Park Residents' Association Annual General Meeting

May 2023 and Extraordinary General Meeting, July 2023

Lea Park Residents' Association held its Annual General Meeting on 25 May 2023 at Thame Town Hall. The outgoing Chair (Elaine Kidd) explained the key role of the Association in helping to forge a sense of community on the Lea Park estate, including campaigning for improvements to the estate where possible. Elaine stressed that if the Association was to continue and be successful in helping residents it was essential for volunteers to come forward and be involved in the work of the Association.

The main business of the evening was to elect the Association's Officers and its Committee which would run the Association during 2023/24. David Currie and Karl Braisher agreed to continue in the roles of Treasurer and Media Secretary respectively. Unfortunately, no further volunteers came forward for the officer roles, so with the threat of the Association having to be dissolved, Elaine Kidd (Chair), Joe Chapman (Vice-Chair), Ken Lewis (Membership Secretary) and Simon Heap (Secretary) agreed to continue in their roles for two months to allow time for further volunteers to come forward and an Extraordinary General Meeting to be held to either appoint to the vacant roles or the Association dissolved.

The entertainment for the evening was a really interesting talk by Phillip Williams of the Thame Historical Society on Thame's association with the English Civil War and the derivation of the street names on Lea Park.

The Extraordinary General Meeting was held on 19 July 2023 at Barley Hill School with the intention of appointing to the remaining Officers roles.

A number of volunteers were forthcoming with Mark Goodall being elected Chair, Judith Edwards as Vice-Chair and Simon Heap as Secretary, with the post of Membership Secretary remaining vacant. Samantha Bellia, Joe Chapman, Graham Reed and Bridget Trueman were also elected to the Association's Committee as Resident Representatives. Elaine Kidd and Ken Lewis agreed to help the new Committee while it found its feet.

The meeting also considered a range of suggestions for projects the Association could be involved. Steve Paver agreed to act in a liaison role with 21st Century Thame over tree planting on the estate. The Committee was asked to consider taking the other projects forward if possible.

The Committee was also asked to consider including Wentworth Road and surrounding roads as part of the Association.
